Help Stop Bullying

Bullying is a widespread and serious problem that can happen anywhere. It is not a phase children have to go through, it is not "just messing around," and it is not something to grow out of. Bullying can cause serious and lasting harm.

Although definitions of bullying vary, most agree that bullying involves: 1) imbalance of power (people who bully use their power to control or harm and the people being bullied may have a hard time defending themselves); 2) intent to cause harm (actions done by accident are not bullying; the person bullying has a goal to cause harm); and 3) repetition (incidents of bullying happen to the same person over and over by the same person or group). Bullying can take many forms. Examples include: verbal (name-calling, teasing); social (spreading rumors, leaving people out on purpose, breaking up friendships); physical (hitting, punching, shoving); or cyberbullying (using the Internet, mobile phones or other digital technologies to harm others).

Here are some strategies to share with your child about bullying:

- Tell them to stop.
- Walk away. Do not let them get to you. If you walk away or ignore them, they will not get that satisfaction.
- Protect yourself. Sometimes you cannot walk away. If you are being physically hurt, protect your-self so that you can get away.
- Tell an adult you trust. Talking to someone could help you figure out the best ways to deal with the problem. In some cases, adults need to get involved for the bullying to stop.
- Find a safe place. Go somewhere that you feel safe and secure like the library, a favorite teacher's classroom, or the office.
- Stick together. Stay with a group or individuals that you trust.
- Find opportunities to make new friends. Explore your interests and join school or community activities such as sports, drama, or art. Volunteer or participate in community service.

The Jeffrey Johnston Stand Up for All Students Act (Florida Statute 1006.147) prohibits the bullying or harassment, including cyber bullying, of any public K-12 student or employee. Schools should be a safe place for teachers and children to teach and learn. In the instance that you suspect your child might be a victim of bullying or might be the perpetrator of bullying you are encouraged to contact your school administrator immediately.
